Dear Friends,

The calendar is filled with celebrations of accomplishment. We will dress up as for a wedding. Parties will be held. Gifts, cards and diplomas will be given. Words will be said that announce completion.

Yet the titles for these rituals of completion point to new life: commencement, graduation, confirmation, the movement from fifth grade at Canterbury Elementary School to sixth grade are recognized as new steps into life.

A friend of mine writes, beautifully, of how these early experiences, being nurtured by others as we grow into adulthood, may instruct us for all our life stages. She says that our myth of extreme independence is always false. We always live, however tentatively, in community with each other. The rhythm of giving and receiving is a life-long rhythm.

For instance, my friend proposes that we view the years from 55-75 as “the age of active wisdom”, that we not withdraw, but that we discover new ways to contribute as we might become less self-sufficient in other ways. She suggests we think in terms of interdependency. It’s more real.

Those of us with long life experience have much to share. Those of us starting out have fresh insights and creative energy, unencumbered by too much living. As one of our children said to me several years ago, “Dad, you’re often answering questions we are no longer asking.”

As we enter our times of new beginning, may the conversation and the work be done together, anticipating always what good things will come next.

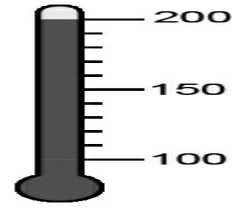

A few housekeeping notes at the Recycling Center:

We have recently had to remove several pieces of constructions debris from the burn pile. All loads must be checked before you dump; the pile will remain roped off to prevent pressure treated, plywood, particle board, window trim, etcetera that are absolutely **NOT ALLOWED** per state regulations. This material, if burned, releases harmful carcinogens into our air and significantly decreases air quality right here where we live.

You may or may not have noticed we are trying to clean up the accumulated debris around the recycling facility to streamline operations and keep safe walkways open to all necessary areas. Please help us by asking for assistance if you don't know where something goes. Empty/quasi-empty paint cans, plant pots, full and empty cat litter buckets, cardboard boxes and various miscellaneous items are being left inside the building on a regular basis. Residents and staff can easily trip on them, so please simply ask if you aren't sure where something goes! We are more than happy to help with placement of items, as it makes less work for us handling them again to put them in the correct recycling or trash areas later on.

Our plastic screw-cap recycling program seems to have a steady market on the other end of the recycling chain so we are continuing to collect plastic screw-tops in the bucket located on the plastic bottle recycling tray. **PLEASE** do not include plastic pop-tops or metal lids. Metal lids are recyclable in with the steel food cans.
