FROM THE PASTOR



Dear Friends.

After leaving the Londonderry bus station at 4 am on August 12 to Boston for a 7 am flight from Logan Airport, we landed in Bozeman, Montana at 12:15 pm, MST, Mountain Standard Time. Bozeman International Airport seems to have doubled in size since we last traveled here in December, 2012. The place retains its feel, though. Different ranges within the vast backbone of the Rocky Mountains frame this city of 40,000. Our daughter, Bekah, and her husband, Mike, live in a small white frame, two bedroom house, a remnant of what is still a tenant farmer's ranch on the northern edge of Bozeman. Corrugated aluminum out buildings are scattered around, housing equipment and materials. Bekah and Mike rent the house, working at jobs in Bozeman, not working on the ranch.

Standing on the edge of their vegetable garden, looking out across the pasture at the Cottonwoods that line the East Gallatin River half a click to the north, the Bridger Mountains loom. East of the Bridgers are the Absarokas/Bear Tooth Mountains, flanked by the Crazy's to the North. Our children and grandchildren spend weekends camping and hiking in this pristine wilderness. This land has seen many changes among the humans who live here. They are inconvenient to inhabit and to explore, even, or especially, by today's living standards. They resist taming. And, there are no cheap flights to Bozeman.

Montana's sparse population is scattered across a huge landscape. I often say that even the blades of grass are far apart in Montana. Distances between people take on a different perspective. And yet, it's easy to see similarities between the people of Montana and New Hampshire. A strong, resilient, independent spirit thrives, expressed often in a desire to work hard and not to be told what to do by others. Montana folks speak of the intrusions of California people like New Hampshire's people refer to those, like yours truly, who migrated up from Massachusetts. The ethos, the public way of being, in Montana is akin to that of New Hampshire.

The dilemma of how to be people who live by order which is not oppression, and freedom which is not license, has perplexed us since our country's founding. And, the struggle to resolve this dynamic is universal and ancient. I take odd comfort in knowing that this challenge has never been resolved once and for all, as though all we had to do was reach back and reclaim it.

As we enter another season of presidential primary campaigning, a season that we in New Hampshire get to see up close and personal, I always hope that a reasonable voice will emerge who succeeds in blending these often contradictory notions into a way of being that weaves strength, resilience, compassion, and joy.

After dwelling among the Rockies and the Grizzlies, and living with our children and grandchildren, we will return to New Hampshire on August 26. I will be glowing with the blessing of two weeks worth of being "Grampie" to Zeke and Elin, and "Dad" to my children.

It's time to glance up and look at the Bridgers as I sign off. Be well, dear friends.

CES has two new staff members. **Kristin Doucette** is our physical education teacher. 3rd Annual Monarch Festival at Petals in the Pines Saturday, September 12 from 9-4

Come to *Petals in the Pines* for a day focused on learning about, and celebrating, the amazing Monarch butterfly. Tour our 24 theme gardens, including the "Butterfly Garden," where you can learn how to attract these colorful creatures to your yard. We'll have information and fun activities for young and old alike, crafts for kids, and a wide variety of unique Nature Explore playplaces. *Petals in the Pines* has been chosen by NH Magazine as the 2015 Best Outdoor Classroom in the state! Mexican food will be available, sold by the BHS Spanish Club as a fund raiser for their fall trip to Costa Rica.

The Monarch population has been drastically reduced in recent years, and we plan to educate our visitors on what can be done to help save them. Visit our "Monarch Maternity Ward" garden and "Pollinator Garden" to search for Monarch eggs, chrysalises, caterpillars and butterflies. We'll do butterfly wing tag and release demonstrations (if we have any Monarchs emerging.) There's something here for all ages! A \$5 per adult donation is suggested and kids are free. Donations will help us continue our work in advocating for the Monarch butterfly.

Stop by the farm stand for whimsical garden crafts or for plants that attract butterflies to add to your landscape. Monarch Butterfly Watch

Early September is peak migration time for Monarchs, when they fly from our region all the way to Mexico to their overwintering site. For the past several years I've been tagging Monarch butterflies as a citizen scientist for Monarch Watch at KSU. The Monarch population has plummeted over the last several years, and much research is being done on this miraculous butterfly. Monarch caterpillars eat milkweed as their sole source of food. If you have milkweed growing in your yard and notice any caterpillars living on the plants, I would be happy to raise them to the butterfly stage so they can be tagged for their trip south. Monarch caterpillars are yellow, black, and white but are not fuzzy. (There is another milkweed caterpillar with the same colors that is very fuzzy--the Tussock Moth.) If you have any Monarch caterpillars you can either drop them off in a container with air holes and some milkweed leaves at Petals in the Pines, 126 Baptist Rd., or I will come get them-either way, please call first and leave a message. Town Administrator news

The Selectmen and Town Office Staff would like to thank Gordon Jackson, Dale Caswell, Sandy Morris and the Highway Department for the work done around the fire pond next to the Town Office. The old chain link fence and posts were removed and the brush that had grown up through the fence and around the pond was cleared. The work has greatly improved the appearance of the area.

Work is continuing on the new platform for the town website. We hope to have the new site up and running in early fall. The Board of Selectmen and the Budget Committee met in August to review the budget. At this time the budget is in line with where it should be given we are just past the 6 month mark.

Our Town Assessor, Mandy Irving, completed a weeklong Fundamentals of Mass Appraisal class sponsored by the International Association of Assessing Officers on August 7th.

The Sam Lake House Renovation Committee is continuing the work on plans to present to the town for renovation of the Town Office building.

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
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
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COME WALK WITH US
