

FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

During early August, Karen and I spent a week visiting our family in Bozeman, Montana. Ben, our oldest, his wife, Kristen, and our two grandchildren, Zeke (9 y/o) and Elin (6 y/o) took us camping in the Deer Lodge National Forest, about two-three hours north of Bozeman. For three days we hiked in the wilderness, and a thunder storm swept over us every late afternoon. On the third day, as we relaxed in our campsite after a long hike, the pattering of rain signaled the beginning of the daily storm.

Expecting the usual storm, a thunderous ten minutes with some rain, we retreated under the flap of one of our tents to wait it out. Zeke and Elin zipped themselves in the tent to play a game. We sat sipping coffee. The rain and wind commenced in earnest. However, the storm increased with ferocity. Within minutes we couldn't hear anything but a roaring wind that rolled up the tent with us in it, pelting us with hail and rain all the while. The wind quickly knocked us down.

It was scary. Objects were being slammed about, and the kids were zipped into the tent. We got them out and into the vehicle. Two of us held on to the tent to prevent it from flying away. Eventually the wind subsided. Large pine trees were uprooted and strewn all over the campsites around us. There were no injuries among the campers and no vehicles were crushed.

I thought, well, it will be a few hours before the roads are cleared. However, the other campers were people who worked on ranches and farms. Within minutes the melodic sound of chainsaws filled the air. Roads were quickly cleared and we drove out of the mountains, our vehicle filled with our rain-soaked gear and ourselves back to Bozeman.

We expressed grateful, prayerful thoughts as the energy of the crisis ebbed. During the quiet ride home I thought, well, that was hard, but we responded pretty well. We cared for the children first, then we tried to salvage our bent pole tent, and filled our vehicle with all our gear in case the storm circled around and came back. Last, but not least, all the campers checked in with each other to see if there was any need.

One of the books I read on vacation was "TRIBE, On Homecoming and Belonging", by Sebastian Junger. Junger wrote "The Perfect Storm" and directed the award winning film "Restrepo", based on his experience with Army troops in Afghanistan. Junger asserts at the end of his introduction to Tribe, "Humans don't mind hardship, in fact they thrive on it; what they mind is not feeling necessary. Modern society has perfected the art of making people not feel necessary. It's time for that to end."

At the heart of congregational life is the claim that all persons are necessary. September for me is always a time to renew that agreement, that covenant among ourselves. Even without natural catastrophe or tragedy, we take that claim seriously and joyfully. We invite you to join us in this work of caring for each other, every day of the year.

Cold River Ranters will play from 12-2pm and The Jordan Tirrell-Wysocki Trio will perform from 2:30-4pm.

The 2016 installation of *Shaker Traditions: Contemporary Translations* was unveiled on August 6 during Village Rising and will be on display through December. The special exhibit features contemporary works from artists in a variety of mediums and reflects the myriad ways in which the Shaker legacy continues to resonate with us today. Monarch Butterfly Watch

Early September is peak migration time for Monarchs when they fly from our region all the way to Mexico to their over-wintering site.

For the past several years I've been tagging Monarch butterflies as a citizen scientist for Monarch Watch at KSU. The Monarch population has decreased over the last several years, and much research is being done on this miraculous butterfly.

Monarch caterpillars eat milkweed as their sole source of food. If you have milkweed growing in your yard and notice any caterpillars living on them I would be happy to raise them to the butterfly stage so they can be tagged for their trip south. Monarch caterpillars are yellow, black, and white but are not fuzzy. (There is another milkweed caterpillar with the same colors that is very fuzzy--the Tussock Moth.)

If you have any Monarch caterpillars you can either drop them off in a container with air holes and some milkweed leaves at *Petals in the Pines*, 126 Baptist Rd., or I will come get them. You can track our Monarch activity on our *Petals in the Pines* Facebook page.

I will be returning to Zimbabwe for 2 months in mid-September. Our children call me back to be a part of their lives and to make a small difference. They are in my heart and I can't leave them,

Your support over the past years has allowed us to educate over 100 children from primary through secondary school. We currently have 6 students in college and 4 graduates, a lawyer, a banker and 2 teachers. Our annual education budget is approximately \$18,000 per year. We also send \$500 per month for food and discretionary items such as solar lamps, shoes and uniforms. We have 6 successful poultry and other small farm animal projects and have just started another one to empower an HIV + young man living with his grandmother.

September 10 we will participate in an annual shipping container filled with clothes, bikes, soccer balls, books, raincoats, backpacks. and medical supplies.

We have formed and registered a sister organization in Zimbabwe named Lighthouse Mission Trust. When I am not there, some of our former students and local leaders oversee our projects.

We are literally a light in the dark and hope in a challenging economy. The love that is returned with smiles and hugs is a blessing worth more than I can ever explain.

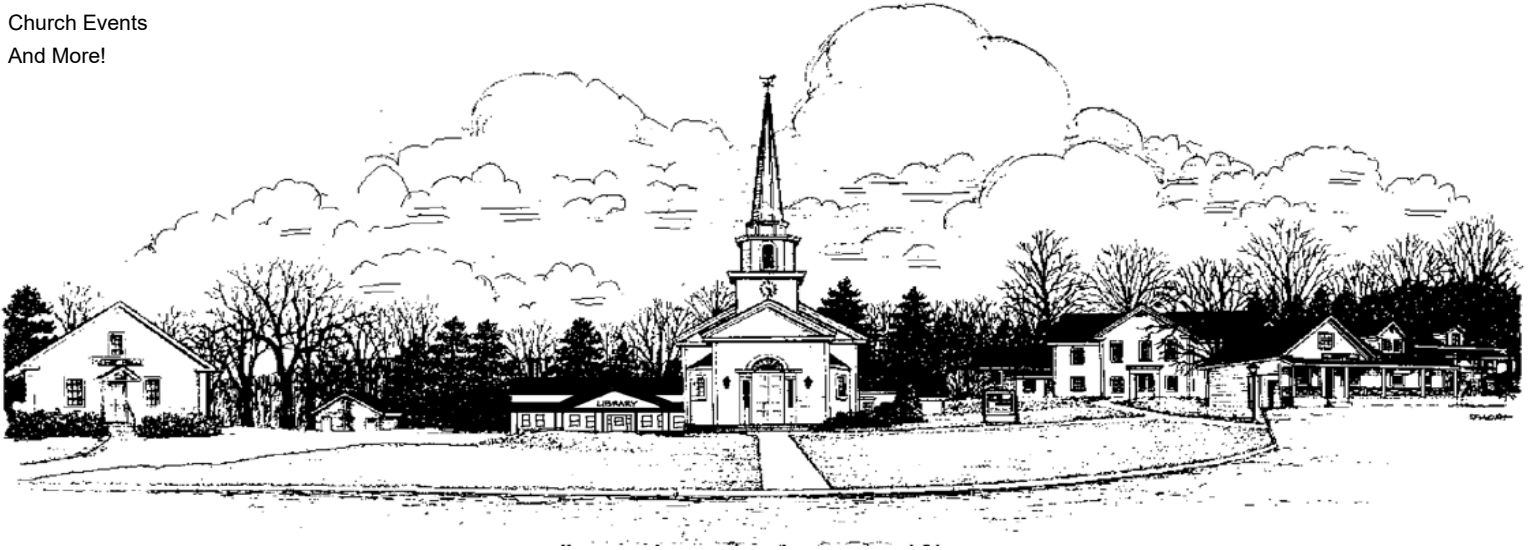
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Hike Canterbury September 2016

Quite possibly the best hiking in Canterbury is at Shaker Village. The grounds are always open as the village sold an easement some years ago, and, as most easements do, it stipulates availability for non-motorized public recreational use at all times.



My favorite short walk is down Shell Church road, by the West Family mill site then along the east shore of Meadow Pond, by the largest pine I know of in town. The trail's well made – by the Student Conservation Corps. You can pull off Shaker Road and park at the beginning of Shell Church Road which goes West just South of Greg and Hillary's brick Shaker house. Just before the bridge over Peverly Brook the trail starts left at an old log landing. After passing the old mill site it soon follows along the east bank of the brook. Be sure and look back to the stone arch of the bridge, which is often so well reflected in the outflow pool that it's very difficult to tell the difference between the actual bridge and the reflection. The trail soon follows mostly pretty close to the edge of the pond, through nice woods with large trees. You'll reach the pine, tight alongside the trail and next to the pond, in about 20 minutes. Return or continue on to a bar gate with old stone posts near the pond edge. Go left up the wood road which comes out at the brick Shaker Trustee building right at the top of Shaker Hill, and double the length of your walk. (To be continued in a future Newsletter)
