Making it all possible were our unsung heroes, the setup, registration, cashout and takedown crews. And keeping it all moving were our tireless runners: Tommi, Mary, Abby, Henry, Cate and Anna.

What it all added up to was a great night in a great community. Thank you for your support of the church and its work in Canterbury and beyond.

The BHS girls' team placed 7th in the 37 school Division III State Championship Meet. The boys' 4x100m and 4x400m Relay teams went onto school record setting performances at the State Meet of Champions on June 3.

The Muchyedo Banks Trail

The legend tells that the Muchyedo Banks got their name from an incident that took place during the Colonial era. It seems that an athletic young Native American named Pawgemucket stole the “stylish, ancient, velveteen go-to-meeting britches” of one of the settlers in Boscawen. Pursued by an angry mob Pawgemucket dove into the Merrimack River and swam across to the steep banks on the Canterbury side, where he then scrambled up the 80 foot high banks “like a squirrel”. At the top of the bank he waved the britches over his head and taunted his pursuers to come and get them. Later Pawgemucket was asked how he managed to climb the steep and slippery loose banks. His reply was brief and to the point: “Much ye do” to climb those banks. Other variations of the story suggest that he had stolen a sack of potatoes instead of pantaloons and refer to the banks as “Muchldo” instead of “Muchyedo”.

Whatever the truth may be, the Muchyedo Banks are worth going to see and the trail to the site is neither difficult nor long. The property is owned by the NH Fish & Game Commission and is open to the public so you'll not be hiking on any private property. You can also check out the other trails on this 290 acre wildlife management property while you are there. The trailhead parking area can be found at the intersection of Oxbow Pond Road and Riverland Road. There is a kiosk and gate and small parking area. A little less than a half mile from the trailhead you come to the Muchyedo banks.

From the top of the bank looking down to the river it is easy to imagine the Indian trying desperately to scramble up the bank and elude his pursuers. From this top of the world vantage point you can also see any boats, canoes, or tubing activity on the river as well as any Canadian Geese or flocks of ducks or other wildlife floating or following the river. Across the river in Boscawen there is a giant cornfield and perhaps farm tractor activity going on. You can turn around here and return back to your car after a pleasant one mile round trip exercise loop, or if you are so inclined you can keep going further on the trail.

Another half mile up the trail and you'll come to a trail intersection that turns west into the interior of the property. ½ mile down this trail you come to many other trail intersections that branch out in several directions, all of which dead end so you'll need to plan accordingly for your return trip. These trails are not necessarily well marked, but you are surrounded by the river on three sides and the railroad on the fourth, so you can't really get lost unless you wander around in circles. As you are wandering around you'll likely notice several monitoring wells that were installed when the property was once proposed as a landfill site.

If you explore all of these spur trails you'll have trekked over five miles, so save enough energy to hike back to your vehicle. Be careful not to twist an ankle or muchyedo to get back to your car.

TOWN ADMINISTRATOR NEWS

The Selectmen accepted Fire Chief Pete Angwin's resignation effective on June 25, 2017. Pete and his wife Rose are retiring to North Carolina. The Selectmen wish to thank Pete for his many years of dedicated service to the Town.

Canterbury Police Officer Tom Bibeau is currently attending the NH Police Standards and Training Full-Time Police officer training academy. He is scheduled to graduate on August 18th. This will allow him to work as a certified full-time officer for Canterbury PD.

Our audit has been completed by Melanson & Heath. Canterbury's continues to have a very healthy financial outlook. The audit will be posted to our website.

Highlights include:

1. At the close of the current fiscal year (2016) the unassigned fund balance for the general fund was \$1,047,521. A change of \$ 124,280 in comparison to the prior year.
2. At the close of the current fiscal year (2016) the total of assets exceeded liabilities by \$10,623,722 (i.e., net position), a change of \$47,740 in comparison to the prior year.

Our long term debt decreased by \$168,000. Independence Day celebrations will take place on July 4th, with activities in the morning in the Center, and fireworks at dusk at Canterbury Elementary School.

SUMMER SQUASH SAUTEED WITH GARLIC AND PARSLEY

6 to 8 small summer squash (about 1 ½ lb.) 3 Tbsp. chopped fresh parsley (flat leaf is best)
3 Tbsp. olive oil 1-1 ¼ tsp finely grated lemon
2 large cloves garlic, finely chopped fresh ground pepper to taste
Salt to taste

Slice squash into pieces ½ inch thick. Heat olive oil in a large skillet. Drop squash into hot oil gradually, slightly browning each handful before adding the next one. Saute squash until golden brown and tender. Takes 6 minutes. Place squash in a serving dish and toss with garlic, parsley, lemon, pepper and salt.

RHUBARB BARS

1 c. flour plus 5 Tbsp. 2 eggs, well beaten
5 Tbsp. confectioners sugar 1 ½ c. sugar
½ c. butter ¾ tsp. salt

2 c. finely chopped rhubarb

Sift 1 cup flour with confectioners sugar and cut in butter. Mix as for pie crust. Press into ungreased 9 x 13 pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes. Set aside. Combine rhubarb, eggs, sugar, 5 Tbsp. flour and salt. Mix thoroughly. Spoon over crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. Serve warm or cold.
