

From the Pastor

Greetings Canterburians,

This newsletter is probably hitting your mailbox in the sweet afterglow of Easter, as the taste of chocolate eggs are still on our lips and the unmistakable scent of Easter lilies still lingers in the air. This week we can see the CUCC wooden cross displayed outside in the town center. Last week it stood stark and black in the church as a witness to death and humanity's falling far short of the wholeness intended for us. Only now that symbol is transformed through the power of divine love into a sign of new life and hope by God's grace, as we adorned it with flowers on Easter morning. If we believe that new life and healing is possible, or as we say in church, if we believe the power of resurrection is real, how we move forward in response to this resurrection moment still can make a difference in our world.

In the coming weeks as our Easter celebrations of life eternal and the awakening of spring fade into the past, I invite you to keep them alive by responding to this great transformation by sowing the seeds of justice and peace where you live. In his last days, Jesus instructed his disciples to seek to live out his commandment, "love one another, as I have loved you" (John 13:34). The best way we live that out in community is to seek justice and peace for our neighbors far and wide. There are many scriptures to which one can turn that inspire us to do justice and seek peace – passages from the Jewish prophets who implore us to answer the question, "What does God require of us" (Micah 6:8), or which encourage us to be "repairers of the breach" (Isaiah 58: 12). We can turn to Matthew 25: 31-46 to learn that what we do to "the least of these" we also do to God. Our sacred texts are filled with the call to do justice and to tear down the "dividing walls of hostility" (Ephesians 2:14) that separate us from our sisters and brothers.

As a response to newness of life in this season, I invite you to express a newness of hope in the power of love and life. You will find many opportunities around town described in our newsletter to engage your neighbors in beneficial community. We don't need to look far to find other opportunities around us, as well, to be bearers of hope and light in a world so much in need of it. And, of course, always feel free to join us at the church to be a part of how we are journeying together to follow in the way of Jesus.

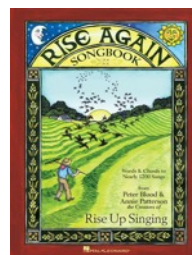

HISTORICAL SOCIETY UNDERTAKING A MAJOR STUDY

The CHS is embarking upon a new venture, a survey of Canterbury's architectural and cultural resources. Canterbury is blessed with an abundance of old farmsteads, houses, barns, cemeteries, bridges/culverts, cellar-holes and the like, but there has never been any systematic survey of them or an assessment of their importance to the Town's history.

The survey will be conducted over the course of the next year, and we hope to conclude it with an exhibit in the Elkins Memorial Building in 2019. The survey will be conducted by a team led by Harry Kinter, BA and MA in history, and CHS archivist Sam Papps (about to earn his BA in history). They will be assisted by a committee of townspeople with experience and interest in this process. We are also seeking the assistance of the NH Division of Historical Resources to provide us with information on previously reviewed resources in Canterbury, including Shaker Village, Clough Tavern, and others, as well as technical assistance.

FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

On March 2nd, the department responded to a significant fire in a residence on Briar Bush Rd. The fire originated in the basement and spread to the upper floors of the building causing significant damage throughout. Fortunately, no one was home at the time of the fire and there were no civilian injuries. One firefighter sustained a minor knee injury and is now fully recovered.

There were several lessons learned or reinforced at this incident.

- The value of the mutual aid system proved itself again. Departments assisting us included Belmont, Loudon, Tilton/Northfield, Boscawen, Chichester, Epsom, and the Chief Coordinator. These towns provided equipment and personnel to assist us in the suppression efforts.
- Maintaining clearances around any heating device is critical. Materials stored close to a heat source will dry out, reducing their ignition temperature and eventually ignite.
- Securing your important documents so that they survive a fire can make filing an insurance claim a little easier. Consider keeping a separate copy of your policy with contact information at a different location.
- Immediately after a fire you may be overwhelmed with vendors that provide services such as clean-up, board-up and companies that will assist in filing your claim to insurance for a fee. Ask for assistance from family or friends in dealing with these vendors so that you do not get pressured into signing contracts during this stressful time.

Fortunately, this fire did not occur at night. Fires starting in a remote location in the building can gain significant headway before you become aware of them. This can greatly reduce your evacuation time. Interconnected smoke detection on all levels of the building will greatly improve your chances of a safe evacuation.
